## **Data Collection**

For my data collection, I will be conducting interviews and sharing my personal testimony. Previous classes have taught me different search strategies, and personal interviewing is my favorite. Before I started collecting data, I asked questions to use during an interview with one of my peers. Having more open-ended questions than closed ones to gather more information from the respondent. Collecting this data, I sat down with my friend and asked 5 different questions about flooding in East Saint Louis.
