Reflection 3

Primarily, I would handle the brainstorming process a little differently for the outline. I hope that with the next few visits we can correct that.

When trying to compare our own research with what I found in the source, there are a few key similarities and differences. First, the source deals mainly with bullying, which is a subset of violent acts. This is different from our own research, as we're focused on the broader issue of violence altogether. Another key difference is that the source is focused on the impacts of violence prevention programs around the world, whereas our own research is more focused on one specific community. The article goes on to say "The aim of this review is to summarize findings from studies of the effectiveness of school-based antibullying programs in reducing both bullying perpetration and victimization..." This underscores the idea that this research may not be the most informative for dealing with a specific community or group. This also contrasts with our own research in the fact that the source is dealing with more of a literature review of programs that have been implemented. While going through this article, I have learned a few things. First, on average, these types of programs do see some success, however, it is extremely difficult to gauge how successful one of these programs might be from the start. I also learned that these types of programs tend to do better with smaller groups, which makes it more personal.

Reflection 5

This semester has definitely been a learning experience for me. I thought I had somewhat of an idea of how on-site research was going to go, after all, I already had quite a few CODES classes under my belt. It turns out that the previous classes missed something that is vital to field research, which is what happens when things don't go according to plan. From the very beginning, we were met with challenges that we didn't see coming. For instance, the IRB took much longer than we initially expected. This ended up pushing us back by about a month. Thankfully, in the end this didn't cause too much of a problem, but it was still a shock. This ties in with the most important lesson that I learned throughout this class, which was how to adapt to an unforeseen circumstance. For one, the kids seemed to lose a bit of steam over the weeks, and it was also tough to get them to open up about violent experiences, which is completely understandable. I also learned quite a bit about myself and how I work as well. Instead of taking a lead role in creating the video, I left most of it up to the kids while I kept them on topic and helped create a dialogue between them. This inadvertently helped me realize that I sort of like that role. I'm not unfamiliar with taking a leadership role in a project, but I never enjoyed it. This let me take a step back and relax a little bit, while also contributing to the overall project as well. Overall, I

think this semester has been the most educational for me in terms of skills I'll be able to take to my career. It's also been the most fun, although it has been stressful. I'm also very thankful that I have a team that is reliable and good to be around, even if it doesn't seem like I think that sometimes.
