Journalists Miles and May-Curry use emotional appeals in "Heirlooms, Redefined" to appeal to the black community and shed light on the non-traditional family heirlooms that still carry generational significance through photographs and storytelling. By adding the element of nostalgia through the photographs depicting the families and their heirlooms to illuminate the viewers to reflect and relate to the heirlooms exhibited and finding the shared significance behind them. They also empower viewers to be proud of their families' generational gifts by telling the stories of each photographer's heirloom and emphasizing the importance of their value. Miles and May-Curry use this article to redefine the minds behind the traditional and practical ideas of what a family heirloom is and celebrates the commemoration of family heirlooms no matter what they are or what they look like.
